This detailed analysis will put emphasis on the formation of the church, the ministry of the Holy Spirit, and the missionary strategy of the apostolic church.

A study of the Biblical foundations, the importance, basic meaning, and the historical background of public Christian worship. Attention is given to principles, plans, methods, and helpful materials.

_____ Bi 205 The Major Prophets
The books of Isaiah through Daniel are presented. Hermeneutics, and its bearing on an understanding of the revelation dealing with both advents is discussed, along with the ethical thrust of the prophetic message.

This course is a follow-up to GS/En 102 and concentrates more fully on the art of good writing.

This is an intermediate course involving the study of syntax and parts of speech. It will emphasize principles of New Testament exegesis.

Its purpose is to establish the student on solid rational ground with reference to the Christian revelation.
