___ Old Testament Survey

(BI102/3 credit hours)

Dr. Light

A systematic presentation of the books of the Old Testament emphasizing the special characteristics of each book and its place in God's total revelation.

___ Philosophy of Education

(ED301/3 credit hours)

Lindley

This course examines the underlying assumptions of Christian education, including the nature of man and the educational ministry of the church.

___ World Religions

(MI301/2 credit hours)

Lindley

A study of the major non-Christian religions of the world, noting the divergence of their teachings from the Biblical faith, and providing a background for the successful approach to the adherents of these systems with the Gospel.

___ Introduction to Psychology

(PSY201/3 credit hours)

Sullivan

This introductory course deals with the principles of psychology: maturation, learning, behavior, and personality development.

___ Reformation Theology

(TH402/2 credit hours)

Greene

Reformation Theology is an introduction to the historical setting, leading reformers, and confessional statements arising out of the Protestant Reformation in the 16th century. The student will learn the history leading to Luther's nailing of the 95 Theses, the life and testimony of Ulrich Zwingli, and the legacy of John Calvin. The significance of the Reformation for today, the need for creeds and confessions, and the importance of a Biblical worldview will be addressed.

___ Corinthian Epistles

(BI204/3 credit hours)

Andrews

This course is designed to acquaint the student with 1 and 2 Corinthians. The application of the truths presented in these letters to corporate church life and the individual Christian is stressed.

___ Greek II

(LA302/3 credit hours)

Dawson

This is an intermediate course involving the study of syntax and parts of speech. It will emphasize principles of New Testament exegesis.
